Sr. Terry Shields has extensive experience working with medical relief teams in refugee camps in Africa and various health related work in the U.S.

Ann Marie Jones is a graduate of Dawn's Place Program and a Peer Specialist. She is a staff member of Dawn's Place where she assists the women through the program process. She has successfully developed and facilitates a 12 step program for women who self-identify with being addicted to prostitution.

Equal Pay Day - April 8

Were you tired on April 8, 2014? You should have been! Because that is how much longer the average woman had to work in order to earn the same amount that the average male worker earned as of December 31, 2013!! That's more than **three months longer** than the average male had to work to earn the same amount!

So, on that day, our branch collaborated with West Chester University Women's Center and Association for Women's Empowerment (AWE) on a project that was designed to educate students and staff at the University about the continued existence of the pay gap between men and women. Many of our members volunteered to provide baked goods, and others helped out at the table on the day of the event.

Our presence in Lawrence Center Dining Hall was well-received as over 370 people stopped at the table, most of whom voted by placing a marble into a container marked "yes," "no," or "I don't know" in answer to the question: "Do you think that gender pay equity is still an issue in the U. S. today?" The final tally was: 323 "yes", 22 "no", and 25 "I don't know."

Once they had voted, and regardless of how they had voted, all participants received their choice from the large selection of homemade goodies provided by our branch. Even students who at first seemed hesitant or uninterested left with a smile as our volunteers encouraged them and thanked them for their vote – and the baked goods were enough to make anyone smile!

We concluded the day at another table with the same activity in front of Sykes Student Union Theater where students from Women's Center performed their own skits on the subject of sexual harassment, intimidation, and discrimination. Once again, all who passed by were encouraged to vote and enjoy the treats, and we were able to distribute a great deal of information on the topic of gender pay inequity.

Everyone who participated from our branch as well as the many volunteer students from Women's' Center agreed that our goal, "educating as many people as possible about the continued existence of gender pay inequity", was definitely reached!

Special thanks go to Ann Duerr, Yvonne Peiffer, and Felicia Orendorff for making the day a great success!

GETT and PETT Programs

The 14th annual **GETT Program** (Girls Exploring Tomorrow's Technology) and its adult program, **PETT** (Parents-Educators Exploring Tomorrow's Technology,) were held on Saturday, March 15, 2014 at the Phoenixville Area Middle School. It kicked off with another successful helicopter landing piloted by Stacey Sheard from Sikorsky Helicopter.

Over 400 girls from grades 6 to 12, living in the Delaware Valley, attended the program, as well as over 120 parents, educators, and chaperones. The PETT grant paid for a bus to bring 35 girls and their chaperones from Southern Chester County concentrating on the girls within the underserved Hispanic community. A total of 31 sessions were offered for over 400 girls in grades 6-12. There were 20 sessions for middle school and 11 for high school covering many STEM related disciplines.

We had 15 plus branch members volunteering for this GETT event and many who I spoke to had a fantastic experience and can't wait to do it again. Our Branch, through PETT, provided Pre and Post Event Evaluations to the adults. Sharon Kaufman and Valerie Connors had the task of filtering through the evaluations to compile a list of what is working and what can be improved and some that can be eliminated. We will share a full report for the PETT grant once it is formally compiled and completed.

From the adult (parent, educator, chaperone) *post*-program evaluations, comments included: "Exceeded expectations! Well done."
"Love what you are doing for the girls."

"Really enjoyed the professional delivery of information and resources to help guide our daughter."

"Expectations were more than met!"

The general consensus is to continue what we are doing while addressing suggestions to add or expand on certain sessions. We will continue to work on funding for the PETT program once the grant year ends on June 30th, 2014. If you can identify potential donors please contact Valerie or me.

Legislation and Public Policy (LAPP) By Ann Duerr

"In times like these, we don't give up—we double down."

Lisa Maatz, AAUW Vice President of Government Relations, expressed her frustration when the U.S. Senate voted along party lines to prevent the Paycheck Fairness Act from receiving an up-or-down vote. They failed to even debate the bill! Thank your senators if they supported the bill. If they did not, then tell them they cannot ignore women and working families any longer.

On April 8th our Equal Pay Event at West Chester University (WCU) was very successful due to the planning of Fran Pierce, Yvonne Peiffer, and the following branch bakers and workers: Anne Anderko, Nancy Day, Ann Duerr, Whitley Harbold, Mimi Jones, Sandi Kwisz, Barbara Lathroum, Patricia Schultz, and Peggy Staarman. Helpers from Association for Women's Empowerment (AWE) included Bria Canady, Adessa Flack, Liz Ian, Felicia Orendorff, and Jacky Rice. A total of 370 students were asked if the pay gap on average between men and women is still a problem. The results: Yes—323, No—22 and Do Not Know—25. Each student was offered a free treat with pay gap information.

PA Senate Bill 75, which strengthens anti human trafficking enforcement and protection for the victims, is now in the PA House of Representatives. Please contact your Rep as soon as possible before the budget year ends in June.

Written messages do make a difference. You can send more than one! Tell your friends and neighbors. Make sure you have the latest League of Women Voter's 2014 Legislative Directory. Pick one up at your local library.

Water, Sanitation & Hygiene PGWI, 7th Annual Conference

Is it easier to get a cell phone than clear potable water and effective sanitation systems to increase better health?

Why don't we hear from world news about the conflicts in the developing countries over water rights, the disparities between rich and poor in their access to sanitation, or how the migration of people to the cities (creating slums) is predicted to grow from 2.5 billion to 5.2 billion by 2050? Have you heard of "Water Mafia"? Why do Bill Gates's projects in "developing countries" get more press than the process in conjunction with "Water for People" to take arsenic out of the wells in places like India and Bangladesh? Why are we reactive rather than proactive, curative rather than preventative? Why do we not realize that droughts and floods are becoming more prevalent and affect people worldwide?

On April 10, 2014 Ann Duerr, along with John and Yvonne Peiffer, represented our branch of AAUW (our branch is a collaborator) at the PWGI 7th Annual Conference entitled "Urban Water Solutions in the Developing World: Sustainable Services and Just Policies for the Poor".

What a conference! We were blown away by all the experts – yes, a lot were women -- from throughout the world with amazing credentials

and expertise. They addressed the issues from the financial, technical, leadership, and management viewpoints. They spoke of women in Peru who were digging ditches for sanitation to help the Peruvian Utility to "get it done"! The women in the developing world are the ones who carry the water long distances and face sexual harassment because of it. They are the ones wanting clean water; sanitation; and educated, healthy children.

Women worldwide are the **stakeholders** who are more likely to tackle social change and to work tirelessly to see that "We the People" rather than "We the Leaders" gain access to potable water, effective sanitation systems, and good hygiene. Hmmm. Perhaps that is why there are 3 women who are heads of state out of the 55 countries in Africa. Perhaps that is why African countries have come up with their own unified goals to follow the United Nations Millennium Development Goals (MDG) that end in 2015.

By the way, the 2 MDG goals relating to water and sanitation have put many countries on the right track. The number of people gaining access to improved water sources increased dramatically. Yet many more need potable water and an infrastructure to maintain the systems built. While many received improved sanitation systems, there are many people who still defecate in the open – thus the world remains off track on the MDG sanitation target. (The target was to reduce the proportion of people without access to sanitation from 51% in 1990 to 25% by 2015. This is not going to happen!)

There are so many facts that we can't detail them all here. However, if you are still reading, imagine having access to water only a few hours a day, needing to travel long distances to get your water, getting your water from standpipes or bore holes or truckers, and paying 15% of your income to get water that is not quality water. What if your bathrooms were latrines that you must share with hundreds of other people or if excrement was defiling what little water you had?

Yes, we in the developed countries can help. Volunteers, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), governments, for profit organizations, corporations, groups from colleges and universities, experts in every area, innovative techniques – all are already helping. However, the emphasis first must be on empowering and educating those who need the help to be in charge of the process, to do a lot of the work, and to develop and maintain the systems built. It takes the people themselves—along with money, technology and good governance—to do and then maintain what gets built or developed. One size does not fit all, and each developing country's geography, climate, water resources, etc. must be part of the solution.

With this in mind, those attending the PWGI 7th Annual Conference got the chance to brainstorm with the experts and to focus on specific solutions to critical issues for the post 2015 UN Millennium Development Goals. These will be shared with the United Nations as it establishes the WASH (Water, Sanitation, Hygiene) related Sustainable Development Goals for the post-2015 period.

Please note that Philadelphia Global Water Initiative (PGWI) has changed its name to The Global Water Alliance. The President is Mrs. Angelita Fasnacht, a Civil Engineer with 18 years experience in environmental and civil engineering with a specialization in water programs. While working in Columbia, South America, her life was threatened, and in 2000 she survived a kidnapping by the FARC—i.e., "The Revolutionary Armed Forces of Colombia".
