with Fran Pierce Saturday, February 11, 10:00 a.m. Grove United Methodist Church

As a new administration takes office in Washington, public education is one issue that will take center stage again. We are delighted to welcome our own Fran Pierce to speak to us about issues in education that will be of interest to us all. The current popular opinion of public education is that it is failing our students and needs major reform even though reform efforts have been going on for 25 years. Fran will help us understand how this opinion was formed, and what charter schools, the single biggest result of the reform movement, have done to create the present education system.

Fran has had a busy career in various aspects of education. She has a Master's Degree in Education and extensive further training in Adult Learning Theory, Organizational Development, Leadership Development and Mediation and Conflict Resolution. Fran spent 33 years as a UniServ Representative from PSEA where she created a peer mediation program and authored a "Prescriptive Portfolio" that allows paraprofessionals in education to reach the "highly qualified status" as required by the "No Child Left Behind" law. After retirement, Fran created her own consulting business, TalkWorks, Inc., that delivers educational consultant and workforce skills to non-profits and small businesses.

Fran is an appointed member of the Chester County Women's Commission, was a member of the board of directors of the YMCA, was Program Chairman and President of AAUW, and is currently president of the Youth Council of the Chester County Workforce and Investment Board. We look forward to hearing her expertise on today's hot topics in education following our delicious brunch.

This might change people's perceptions of our group and attract more and younger women to join our present young-at-heart members. I just want to remind you that **March is Membership Month**.

Nominations for Awards: At our January meeting, I distributed Awards Nomination Sheets. Our meeting ran so long that many of you had no time to fill them out on that night. We vote on these awards at the Brunch on Saturday, February 11th, so time is of the essence. Please mail me your award nominees or email (or text) them to me as soon as possible. I have sent everyone an email with the details. Thanks.

If you are like me, I always enjoy the February Brunch with all the camaraderie among members and guests as well as the luscious food provided by us all. Please bring a breakfast or luncheon dish, a salad or fruit, breads or a dessert. If possible, let Mimi know what you are bringing so that one kind of dish does not predominate. Fran Pierce will speak and lead a discussion on "Hot Topics in Education." With the backlash against testing, the rise of cyber schools, and the push to privatize education, Fran has chosen a timely subject. I read a superb article by an Ohio teacher who correlated test scores with socioeconomic characteristics. Among wealthy students the scores place the U.S. 3rd in the world; middle class student scores put the U.S. among the middle rank countries; but for those in poverty, the scores place the U.S. near the bottom. And sadly, the number of American children living below the poverty line has dramatically increased.

I am writing this epistle after Saturday's Women's March on Washington and sister marches all over the world, including Antarctica! A number of our branch members participated in marches in Washington and Philadelphia. The marches were exceptionally well-organized. Marchers of all ages, sexes, and races were positive, polite, and orderly, simply expressing our concerns as women and minorities. What an experience! As we marched down East Capitol Street to the Mall in Washington, residents opened windows to wave, and people lined the streets cheering with us. As we approached the East face of the Capitol, we gazed down at the Mall filled with a sea of pink hats and homemade signs. Later. we marched down Pennsylvania Avenue, past the Trump Hotel to the White House. When women organize, things get done! Barbara Lathroum

AAUW Members Learn About STEM Opportunities

On Wednesday, January 11, the West Chester-Chester County Branch of AAUW met to learn about STEM opportunities for girls in Chester County. The AAUW has been a strong advocate for educating girls in the sciences and providing them with opportunities to investigate careers in all aspects of technology. We were delighted, therefore, to welcome three women who have been instrumental in reaching girls with information about the fulfilling and exciting careers they can pursue in many scientific fields.

Our first panel member was Jennifer Carling. Jennifer represented the Girl Scouts and spoke about the STEM opportunities offered by this group. She is also part of the current Girls Exploring Tomorrow's Technology (GETT) planning committee. She will also be taking over our own Mary Smith's role as Chairperson of the adult portion of GETT we know as PETT (Parents Exploring Tomorrow's Technology).

Our second speaker, Andrea Vaughn, M.Ed., is Project Manager of the School to Careers Program at the Chester County Intermediate Unit. She has served on the GETT committee for several years, along with our third panelist, Patti Van Cleave.

Patti has chaired strategic parts of the initial planning of GETT events and has connections with other STEM events for Chester County youth. She manages the Chester County Economic Development Council's (CCEDC) Youth Career Exploration Program, which holds events providing school-age children with opportunities to explore careers in agriculture, energy, healthcare and other STEM related fields. We were pleased and fortunate to have these three women share their experiences with us.

In Memory of Yvonne Mae Peiffer



Our Branch of AAUW has lost one of its most active and energetic members. Yvonne Mae Peiffer passed away on December 3, 2016 after a two-year battle with Stage IV stomach cancer.

Yvonne was branch President in 1977-1979 and she again stepped forward in 2006-2007 to help lead our organization. An active member of Great Decisions, Yvonne facilitated a program in conjunction with the *League of Woman Voters on the Philadelphia Global Water Initiative*. Two months before her death, she led the discussion on Global Affairs at the Great Decisions meeting.

During her forty-four years as a member she participated in our book sales, recycling program, Teenage Parents program, Reading is Fundamental in the West Chester School District, and headed the Project Speaking Out and Being Heard. She was Chairperson of the Public Policy committee and kept Branch members informed through her detailed newsletter articles. In 1980, she was awarded both The Outstanding Branch Member and honored with Named Gifts to the Educational Foundation.

Yvonne's interest in AAUW began in 1960 when she received a scholarship from a local chapter in Maryland that allowed her to start her college education.

Yvonne, a Licensed Clinical Social Worker, achieved other credentials including the Diplomat in Clinical Social Work. One of her greatest achievements was developing and initiating the *Post Adoption Services Program* for Chester County Department of Children, Youth, and Families. This program was well known throughout Pennsylvania and replicated not only in our state, but nationally. Our county received much recognition for this innovative program and much needed help for families adopting children who have experienced trauma in their earlier lives.

Yvonne's concern and caring for others was evident throughout her life. Along with her husband, she volunteered in the court's Guardianship program, served in a fact-finding commission concerning the status of offenders in the Pennsylvania Detention Center and the Probation Department. She was the quintessential volunteer and a true AAUW member advocating for equal pay for equal work by baking, transporting, selling and educating community members on the importance of this inequity. She spoke out on the right of women to choose, and the importance of economic empowerment of women.

Yvonne was an inspiration to many and will be greatly missed. A Memorial Service will be held in the summer at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Lionville.

Special Tributes:

"Yvonne was a strong advocate for adoption and services to adoptive families. She inspired her staff and graduate students during her 16 vears at the Chester County Department of Children, Youth and Families. She practiced and taught social work skills, including family counseling to many DCYF staff. Yvonne led by example and helped staff to stretch beyond their comfort zones to try new ideas in parenting, in counseling, and in giving professional presentations. Under her direction DCYF provided support groups, search services and counseling to hundreds of families and children. She was recognized as the Pa Adoption Professional of the Year during her time at DCYF. Yvonne's compassion, guidance and leadership continue to demonstrate long term benefits in many lives today." "Yvonne was always ready to help anybody to solve their problems and trying to cheer you up. She was a great friend."

"Yvonne's contributions to the Teenage Parents Program were enormous, mostly because of her caring concern for the pregnant or parenting teens. She was a tremendous proponent for evaluations, and chuckled heartily when we read the teens' evaluations of a particular program which she and I had considered of great value, but the teens thought was "pie in the sky." Yvonne had a knack for seeing and finding a way to address the needs of others while always maintaining her sense of humor. Her contributions to her greater community were unmatched."

"START SMART" Workshop To be held on April 3rd

The West Chester-Chester County Branch of AAUW and A.W.E. (student affiliate at West Chester University) will hold the second START SMART Workshop on April 3rd 5:30-8:00 pm at WCU's Sykes Ballroom. The workshop is aimed at graduating seniors and others soon to be looking for jobs. Dr. tanya thames-taylor and Jennifer Schultz will be leading the workshop. They are looking for volunteers from our branch to help them facilitate the program. Last year, the START SMART session attracted 63 participants.

START SMART and WORK SMART are programs developed by the National AAUW for women to learn negotiating skills when seeking employment and promotions. Women tend to undervalue themselves in the job seeking process taking salaries and benefits that are offered. Men will more likely negotiate their salaries, benefits and other conditions of employment. This partly explains the gap between men's and women's salaries. Women earn roughly 80% of what a man earns for the same work. This imbalance is much worse for women of color. The program has attracted much public interest. For example, the mayor of Boston has offered the Work Smart program to all of its female city employees.

The United State of Women Summit

AAUW members heard a vibrant and inspiring report from Tammy Williams on The United State of Women Summit at the AAUW program meeting on Wednesday, November 16. Tammy was one of over 5000 women who were invited to the Summit in June, 2016, at which all issues that impact women were discussed, not just the potential election of a woman president.




Tammy outlined the six pillars of issues that were discussed at the Summit, infusing her personal history and passion as well as noting the local impacts of the issues as she spoke.

- *Economic Empowerment:* discussion at the Summit addressed equal pay, paid sick leave and paid family leave, child care, health care, and economic and political participation. Tammy noted that Pennsylvania had fallen to 49th in the USA and that the US is 99th out of 185 countries in the world -- with respect to women elected to government. She stressed the importance of increasing representation by women in government as a change agent.
- *Health and Wellness:* key issues at the Summit included the spending power of Baby Boomer women on health care, the need for global coverage, and the role of the Affordable Care Act ("Obamacare") coverage.
- *Educational Opportunity:* Tammy noted discussion at the Summit was about early childhood education, STEM education for girls, and free community college. She showed a video that told how much girls around the world desired education.

- *Violence Against Women:* The Summit discussed protecting students from sexual assault; other topics were domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking, and human trafficking. Tammy noted the need to reduce the national rape kit backlog.
- Entrepreneurship and Innovation: The Summit discussed the need for training and counseling women entrepreneurs, increasing access to credit, investing in innovation, and women's involvement in global entrepreneurship. Tammy noted her own personal experiences with business leadership and entrepreneurial activity.
- Leadership and Civic Engagement: Tammy noted the need for more support for women in business and public sector leadership, and the increase in women's voice and visibility that is needed at the state and intermediate levels.

At the end of the review of the Summit, AAUW members joined in a spirited question and answer session with Tammy. Members



expressed their concerns with the direction of initiatives that impact women, with the recent election results. Tammy stressed that the best way to keep moving forward with women's issues was to join the movement. She recommended exploring the website for the United State of Women. She mentioned the Women's March on Washington to take place January 21st, stressing the purpose was to talk about what President-Elect Trump should hear about the needs of women – not to protest, but to communicate what is important to us. Tammy finished with the words, "Today we'll change tomorrow."

West Chester's New Theater to Offer Travel Films, Ted Talks, Music, & Dramatic Productions Arlene Rengert

The Pennsylvania National Guard Armory, built in 1916, has stood nearly vacant in the center of West Chester, for quite a while. A few years ago a nonprofit group purchased it (for \$760,000) and has now turned the 10,990square-foot building into a theatrical complex. It opened officially on December 31 with a giant party attended by over 550 people. The largest venue inside is the Knauer Theater for the Performing Arts. It is here that the Travel Film series, formerly at West Chester University and attended by many AAUW members, will resume. The first in the Tuesday evening series will be April 25th and will feature Marlin Darrah, one of the favorite presenters of travel films on the WCU stage. The Uptown Alliance, the organization that raised the \$2-3 million to renovate the building, also has regular jazz music offerings and this March-April will present the Resident Theater production of Spamalot. Advance purchase of tickets via the website is encouraged. Food also is available by advance purchase, and there is a full bar on the premises. (Yes, drinks may be carried into the theater; each of the new and very comfortable theater seats is equipped with a cup holder.) For most performances (including the travel films) the bar and dining area is open for 1-2 hours prior to the program so people can gather and chat. It may be possible to get the use of a nearby, smaller room for a pre-program AAUW gathering.

Parking is at metered spaces in the open lot just west of the building, on the street, or in a nearby parking garage. The building, located at 226 North High Street, is on the National Register of Historic Places.
