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## Letter from the Presidents

"That old September feeling left over from school days, of summer passing, vacation nearly done, obligations gathering, books and football in the air...Another fall, another turned page: there was something of jubilee in that annual autumnal beginning, as if last year's mistakes had been wiped clean by summer." Wallace Stegner, Angle of Repose

I love Wallace Stegner's writing and this quote reflects what I feel about September, summer passing, and a chance for a new beginning. As the West Chester-Chester County Branch begins its new session, Eva and I look forward to a promising year of reaffirming traditions, strengthening current relationships, and continuing popular activities. However, we hope to develop new partnerships with community organizations, expand special interest groups, and create new traditions.

Our members' achievements have been many since our last general meeting. State Representative for the 156<sup>th</sup> District Carolyn Comitta, who was recently endorsed by President Obama, is running for reelection. Patricia Schultz was elected to a Democratic Committee Person position for her precinct. Toni Gorkin was appointed to the Uwchlan Township Environmental Advisory Board. Chiwoneso Tinago won a Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation Award to develop and test a community-based peer intervention for adolescent mothers in Zimbabwe. Octavia Warren Ward was featured in an article in the Daily News as a participant in GETT and an advisor to the Coatesville Raiderbots, a competitive robotics team. There are so many others whose accomplishments are also noteworthy.

National AAUW proposed three bylaw changes late this spring. Members voted to institute staggered terms of office for the AAUW Board of Directors on a three-year rotation. Members defeated a proposal to open the board to people who may not be AAUW

members and they rejected a proposal to eliminate the degree requirement for members. National AAUW Public Policy priorities are adopted every two years. They establish the federal action issues on which AAUW members focus their efforts.

For 2017-2019, National AAUW advocates two broad public policy efforts. The first is to achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women. National hopes to achieve this goal in six ways such as advocating for fairness in compensation and benefits, enforcing employment anti-discrimination statutes, and strengthening programs to improve postsecondary education. The second effort is to guarantee equality, individual rights, and social justice for a diverse society. Vigorous enforcement of and full access to civil rights, self-determination of one's reproductive health decisions, and freedom from violence are three of the seven advocacy methods. Please refer to the National AAUW website for a complete list.

**AAUW-PA** also has set public policy priorities for 2018-2020. Please refer to the AAUW-PA website for details about AAUW-PA's four main goals:

- To enable members and all citizens to participate in a representative democracy and self-governance
- To support a quality system of public education
- To improve the economic selfsufficiency of all women
- To improve the operation and selfsufficiency of government

Before our regular meetings begin in September, members of the West Chester-Chester County Branch will set goals that will be aligned with National and State public policy goals. On Wednesday, September 5<sup>th</sup>, the board will meet at Grove Methodist Church in Fellowship Hall from 6:00-9:00. (Continued on next page)

You do not need to be an officer or committee chair to attend and we welcome new ideas and suggestions.

Over the summer, Anne Anderko and Trish Alfano have developed plans for a unique fundraising drive, Phyllis Dunn and Patricia Schultz will reveal their PMP ideas for the year, and Eva Kaufmann and Mimi Jones will discuss their new Community Outreach Committee.

We hope that strengthening the ties with our present community partners and forming relationships with other community organizations will be primary goals. We have developed partnerships with the Laundromat Library League, the West Chester Food Cupboard, the Girl Scouts of Eastern PA, the WCU Resource Pantry, and GETT. We look forward to building those commitments. However, many of our members are involved in other community organizations and activities. We wish to reach out to organizations in line with our mission to

advocate and educate on behalf of women and girls. Voter registration, gerrymandering, public education, a woman's reproductive rights, environmental concerns, pipeline safety, and sensible gun legislation are just some of the issues that many community organizations tackle and that mirror AAUW's public policy concerns. We invite our members to help our branch form more alliances.

We would like to thank Alice Lenthe for her donation of a computer to the branch. It will be so convenient to have our own computer when guest speakers require one for their presentations. We also thank Alice for setting up our branch Facebook page. It was not easy to do, but, like Elizabeth Warren, she persisted!!

#### Can you help?

The Laundromat Library League was established in 2014 to make children's books available to children that may not have books at home. We now have "Laundromat Library Boxes" in over 115 sites, primarily in Pennsylvania, but also in 12 other states.



Each decorated box invites adults to "take a book, read it with a child, take it home, return it if and when convenient or pass it on." We have been successful in obtaining book donations of all levels, from toddler through teen.

We need help locating laundromats, and especially obtaining contact information of the owner or manager who can give permission for placement. We promise regular tending of the box twice a month, and that the Library Boxes contain only children's books — no promotional material of any kind.
