GETTING TO KNOW YOUR MUSLIM NEIGHBOR

SPEAKER: Bushra Quereshi

October 10, 2018 at 7:00 PM Grove United Methodist Church

Bushra Quereshi will relate her personal experience as a Muslim woman and mother. Americans are in general uninformed about Muslim culture and practices. We read that women across the Mideast live under repressive regimes which regulate women's dress and their conduct and which limit women's access to education and opportunity. We hear about female circumcision and honor killings in some Muslim communities. Bushra will describe how Muslim women live and raise children in the U.S. while remaining committed to their faith.

Suggested Reading: <u>Nine Parts of Desire</u> by Geraldine Brooks. This book describes the journalist's explorations of the lives of women in Muslim countries.

Letter from the Presidents

By the time this newsletter arrives, let's hope the heat and rain of September are gone, and the fresh, cool, golden days of October are here! Chester County in October is simply gorgeous: the corn husks and pumpkins, the hay bales and golden leaves, and the eager trick or treaters at your door!

As an organization with a keen sense of how politics affects the issues we hold dear, we know that October has another meaning. It is going to be one of the most important months of 2018. One more month of effort to influence what we all know will be a crucial election. One more month to register voters and to get out the vote!

In my remarks at the September meeting I asked each of you to make three resolutions:

— the first for yourself: learn more, experience more, enjoy more, all through the programs and activities offered in AAUW. Join a book club, or check out one of our many interest groups. Attend the monthly meetings to learn from our wonderful speakers.

—the second: give back to our organization. This would be a good time to make that offer to help in some way. Can you write for the newsletter, take pictures, or help set up the chairs for our meetings? Check your Handbook for contact information, and make an offer to help out.

—the third: for the community. Now is the time to turn your beliefs into action! What can you do this month to help register voters and to GET OUT THE VOTE! There are many organizations, both partisan and non-partisan, that would love to accept your help in these final few weeks. Voter registration ends on October 9, and the election is less than a month later. Now is the time to volunteer to help a candidate, to stuff envelopes, or to canvas neighborhoods!

As we move through this political season, there are many issues that we should keep in mind. Here are a few to ponder. (From AAUW PA "Highlights," September 2018)

- Fair Districts: the movement to create fair districts has seen major set-backs, but they do not feel defeated. The goal of this movement is to have a commission created that will redraw legislative districts by 2021.
- **Overtime pay**: Did you know that employers do not have to pay overtime to employees who earn more than \$23,660? Governor Wolf has proposed to gradually raise that limit to \$47,892 by 2022. With wages losing their purchasing power every year (4.7% loss between 2012-16) more families depend on the extra pay that overtime provides.
- Paid Family and Medical Leave: The U.S. is one of the few developed countries that does not provide paid leave for people who are suffering a major medical problem, bonding with a child, or caring for an ailing family member. The PA Department of Labor has completed a feasibility study on this topic. Since women are often the primary care-givers of children and parents, this issue is of great interest.

So, ladies, resolve to engage in the political process this October! So many things are dependent on the results next month!

Get Out and Vote!

--Cathy Palmquist The Center for Women and Gender Equity at West Chester University (WCU) sponsors "Women on Wednesdays." September's focus was **Get Out and Vote**, offered by Melissa Robbins, a community organizer/political strategist. Robbins, a single mother of four and Army veteran, attended community college, got a full scholarship to Temple University, and graduated with a degree in Political Science.

"We share the same level of frustration right now," she said as she started her talk, explaining she became an advocate for racial equality while at Temple. In 2008, when she was doing political canvassing door to door, she was met with the "N" word at many homes.

A resident of Philadelphia, Robbins is a member of Philadelphians for Change, Philadelphia Association of Black Journalists, and a host on WURD, the only black radio station in PA. One of her proudest moments was when she was summoned to Governor Tom Wolf's office where he signed an executive order for equal pay for equal work in PA.

Robbins' talk focused on "The Challenges of Women, People of Color and LGBTQ."

Get Out and Vote (continued)

Housing, objectivity, police brutality, over policing, violence/gun violence, poverty, high incarceration rates, and sexism are among the challenges. She talked about what poverty looks like, and mentioned she was in a homeless shelter for a short time when she fell on hard times. "Black, transgender women are the most abused and killed of all."

"How can we create change? What can you do? What policies can be changed on the state and federal level?" she asked. "Who are our leaders? Are they effective? We need to take (continued on next page) time to look at leaders' voting records and confront them in public meetings about their records. We need to become activists, whether it's about one or several issues.We must lobby, volunteer, work on a campaign, donate, endorse, and run for office. There is an election of some sort every six months!" she added.

"Why should you run for office? Who better to create policy? Who better to represent the underrepresented? Who better to build and gain trust? If not you, then who?" she asked. Most important, you must have self-belief. **You CAN win**!" she said in closing, encouraging and challenging the mostly college aged audience to get involved.

Newsletter: Taking Good Photographs

We hope you enjoyed the demo by Cathy Palmquist at the September meeting about how to take good photos. Photos of meetings, events, and activities are very important not only for our newsletter, web page, and Facebook page, but also for getting good coverage in the media in our community. Good photos help us tell the story of the many important things we do as an organization.

For those of you who missed the demo, here are Cathy's tips for taking good photos. Please use them and send us your photos!!

- <u>Avoid "grip & grin", huddling, cuddling,</u> fig leaves (hands in front of private parts – mostly_men).
- <u>Posing people</u> or <u>photographing a group?</u> Stand folks shoulder to shoulder, turned toward each other.
- <u>Large group?</u> Have a sit-down row in front.
- <u>Don't be rushed</u> take time to get photo right! Ask the speaker or certificate presenter ahead of time to stand for you to take the picture.
- <u>Over 4 or 5 people in photo?</u> Have everyone close their eyes and open their eyes on your count of 3.
- <u>Leave space</u> around who/what you are photographing; don't shoot right to the edge of the subject(s). Allow for us to crop in the publication.
- <u>Make sure photo matches the information</u> i.e., if doing a tea, show person pouring tea for another person, such as person in charge of event, president, etc.
- <u>Take photos of action, activity</u>, etc. These are more interesting than a group standing picture (OR do both).
- <u>Background</u> is as important as taking photos. <u>Check what is behind your subject.</u> Watch for exit signs, fire alarm boxes, light fixtures, pictures on walls, plants around and above people. <u>Don't shoot into sun</u>, glass windows/doors, mirrors.

Please let me know if you are interested in any of the tasks we need help with for our media or have other ideas. While I have been able to accept articles up to the last week of the month, it helps to have them by our "official" deadline of the 10^{th} .

Patricia Schultz – Obama Rally

Patricia Schultz attended the Obama Rally in Philadelphia on Sept 21 with 5 women from East Goshen and the Chester County Controller. She reports it was an inspiring and amazing experience. There were approximately 5,000 people of all ages, genders and races. The message of the speech: VOTE!

Pat Bove – Harpist and Baby Cuddler

Patrice Bove is a retired music teacher from Tredyffrin-Easttown School District. She is a PAWLP fellow in writing and reading. She is a member of CCRA, AAUW, PMEA, PSEA, NAMT, and MTA. Presently she is a volunteer at Chester County Hospital and a Cuddler in their baby program (see related article). She also is a harpist and will be performing in a workshop in October as a well as in a Harp program on November 11 at WCU. She is a member of the WCU Harp Ensemble.

A Baby Cuddler

The research of Fritsch-deBruyn, Capalbo, Rea and Siano in 1990 demonstrated that human touch in premature babies can promote weight gain, improve brain development and support shorter hospital stays. Also the studies of Howard, Schiff, and Penwill in 2017 pointed out that more human contact at the bedside can decrease withdrawal severity in infants with NAS (Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome). One baby is born every fifteen minutes with NAS.

In December 2017, through the training by Stefanie Steinberger, Susan Cacciavillano, Matt Leocha, Tracy Bredding and Alyssa Kilby, the baby cuddler program began at Chester County Hospital. A group of volunteers had a day of training and at least two mentor sessions with trained NICU personnel. Babies come to us with medical issues. Our job as teams is to help babies grow and mature so they can go home to their families.

The primary duties of a cuddler are to hold babies, to comfort and contain babies for procedures, sing, read or speak softly and to rock babies. It is touch which will help babies relax, sleep and grow to be healthy children.

As a retired teacher, I enjoyed the love of children, teaching my subject and learning every day. I am still learning as I cuddle these young babies who are coming into the world. I love holding different babies with different personalities, meeting new parents, and best of all working with an outstanding and competent staff of nurses and docters.
