Our speaker that morning will be Robyn Young. According to Barb Lathroum, Robyn is the author of Women in Penn's Woods: A History of Women in Pennsylvania. In this book, Robyn writes about 175 women who made significant contributions to Pennsylvania history. It is through Robyn's efforts that 21of these women are now represented on roadside historical markers throughout the state. She has been appointed the executive director of Pennsylvania's Women's History Project. In October 2018, she became the Pa State Coordinator for the National Collaborative of Women's History Sites. At our meeting Robyn will be speaking about Mary Ann Shadd Cary, an accomplished black woman who was a teacher, editor, abolitionist and lawyer from West Chester in the 19th century. We are looking forward to this presentation, as it's impossible to imagine the obstacles this woman had to overcome to hold such prestigious positions at that time.

In addition to the speaker, we will have a White Elephant raffle. Members can buy raffle tickets and take chances on the items that they wish. It should be fun!

Carol Kuniholm of *Fair Districts PA*Spoke to AAUW in January on Gerrymandering in PA

Carol Kuniholm, the founder of the all-volunteer organization Fair Districts PA, spoke at our branch meeting at Grove Church on Wednesday, January 9. She was motivated to found the group three years ago because of the remarkable inequities that Pennsylvania's highly-gerrymandered districts create in the Pennsylvania legislature as well as in our representation in Washington. She was inspiring, informative, and quite distressing.

She started out by explaining the difference between reapportionment and redistricting. Reapportionment is a decennial process when states gain or lose congressional seats based on the census. Pennsylvania currently has 18 seats in congress but is likely to see that number reduced to 17 after the 2020 census. Redistricting is how each state redraws its

electoral districts in response to the new numbers of seats.

Ms. Kuniholm described gerrymandering as the manipulation of electoral maps for political purposes and said that without fair districts there can be no true representation. There are a number of techniques used to achieve a gerrymandered result even when the number of voters in each redrawn districts is approximately equal. For example, cracking means splitting a population and spreading its voters among several districts to create instant minorities, effectively disenfranchising those voters. Packing means drawing a district in such a way that a significant number of a particular minority resides in that one district although a more equitable voting plan might have members of that minority exercising influence in two or more districts.

The resulting disenfranchisement is demonstrated by seeing that in many Pennsylvania districts (close to 30%) there are uncontested races because the minority party cannot find a candidate to run when the result is not in doubt. Right now Pennsylvania's legislature is controlled by one party and only the leaders of that party really have any influence in (continued on next page)

Harrisburg. Ms. Kuniholm estimated that although there are 253 legislators in Harrisburg, only 5 really have any say in the process. She also told us that no state is more gerrymandered than Pennsylvania, although North Carolina runs a close second. In order to change this state of affairs, Pennsylvania's voting systems and legislative processes need to be changed and that will only happen when the rules change. She urged all of us to get involved by communicating frequently and regularly with our party leaders and to be "focused, polite and relentless."

WCU Resource Pantry



Octavia Warren-Ward, a branch member and a Coatesville Senior High School science educator, recently sent information about her robotics team, the Raiderbots. Her team fostered the inception of four FLL (First Lego League) Junior robotics teams. One of the teams is an all-girls team (FIG3 FLL Junior Team) that includes two girls from a local shelter in Coatesville. The Raiderbots are eager to promote STEM activities with this team because this group of students has little or no access to STEM activities in school or at home. This team of girls works together to create "mini cities on the moon" and uses Lego WeDo kits to learn how to program rockets to move automatically. The Raiderbots team mentors the junior teams by helping with programming, building problem solving skills, promoting team building, and honing public speaking skills.

AAUW Washington Update

This month we are celebrating two major
accomplishments. First, the historic number of
women joining the 116th Congress, many of
whom — along with their male colleagues —
ran and won on issues central to the economic
well-being of families. This week we sent them
AAUW's federal legislative priorities for the
116th Congress and will be working with them
to advance these critical goals.

Second, on January 29, 2019, we will commemorate the tenth anniversary of the

enactment of the Lilly Ledbetter Fair Pay Act. That vital law restored the longstanding position that ongoing pay discrimination at work can be challenged regardless of when the discrimination began. But that law, critical as it is, is only one step on the path to ensuring women receive equal pay for equal work. New tools are needed to help close the pay gap. This week, I presented to the Democratic Women's Working Group, the caucus of all of the Democratic women House members, on why the Paycheck Fairness Act is the next step in ensuring equal pay. The AAUW Action Fund Capitol Hill Lobby Corps amplified this message by visiting House Republicans and Democrats, more than 200 offices, over the last two weeks.

The Paycheck Fairness Act will be reintroduced very soon and we need your help in getting even more members of Congress to support it. We are educating new legislators on the importance of the Paycheck Fairness Act, and reminding everyone that Americans at the local, state, and federal level, regardless of

party, are demanding economic security for women and families.



Reminder as always: The AAUW Action
Network (AAUW Action Network
advocacy@aauw.org) continues to send out
statements about the legislation under
consideration in Congress. The Action
Network statements explain how each piece of
legislation impacts the interests of women and
girls. You are encouraged to read these emails
or read the statements on the AAUW Action
Network website and contact your
representatives accordingly.

Items of interest in January included opportunities to provide input to the Department of Education against weakening Title IX.
