Recognition: 60th Anniversary as an AAUW Branch

We started our November branch meeting at Grove Church with recognition of our 60th anniversary as a branch. We celebrated with a remarkable cake that Jessica Moyer, a friend of Pat Bove's, made for the event. Pat donated the cake. We will have a separate and more formal event to commemorate our anniversary on March 29, 2020.

As part of this celebration, long-time members are giving a short presentation at each meeting about branch history. Lyn Eaton described about our involvement in the TeenAge Parent Program (TAP) that allowed teen girls to continue their education, even though they had to drop out of school when they became pregnant. TAP began serving teens in January of 1970 with AAUW members volunteering at the very beginning as tutors. TAP ended with the school year in June of 1994. That fall the Intermediate Unit began countywide services to pregnant teens.

Postcard Writing Initiative

This meeting inaugurated our postcard-writing initiative to our legislators – a project that we anticipate will continue. Ann Tomalavage prepared posters to help us identify who represents each of us and also handed out postcards for us to use. We sent over 50 postcards to our elected officials, addressing the inequity of the gender pay gap, asking them to support the Equal Pay Act bills before both the Senate and House."

Planned Parenthood: What Now?

Dayle Steinberg, the CEO of Planned Parenthood of Southeastern Pennsylvania, was our speaker at the November meeting. Ms. Steinberg started her presentation with a long and impressive list of statistics. Every month the 600 Planned Parenthood clinics throughout the country see 8000 clients who are seeking health care, sex education, birth control, and cancer screening in addition to abortions. Planned Parenthood, now 102 years old, was founded in controversy and it seems as if very little has changed in that regard.

Planned Parenthood's current health care services include Pap smears, breast cancer screening, sexually transmitted infection treatment and education. Over its more than 100-year history the mission of providing compassionate care has not changed, but technology has expanded the ways in which that care can be delivered. Not only does Planned Parenthood offer one-on-one services, but it also utilizes video, phone and internet technology to reach its clients. For example the facilities overall receive 10,000 texts a month.

As well as providing its traditional services, Parenthood now offers limited primary care services for clients who test HIV positive, gender-affirming care to clients who are transitioning, including hormone treatment, and a safe meeting space for LGBTQ youth.

In talking about abortion, Ms. Steinberg stated that "Reproductive health care is being marginalized as a woman's issue" and that abortion bans have nothing to do with public health and everything to do with control and misogyny. She pointed out that even if the composition of the current Supreme Court were to change with a concomitant change in the Court's stance about abortion and family planning, there are so many state courts with so many anti-choice justices, that a woman's right to control her own body may be eaten away bit by bit, and the rights that women fought so hard for in the past 102 years will continue to be eroded. We need to be vigilant to keep current protections in place.

AAUW Members Support Decade to Doorways Event

Our Gateway to Equity Award winner for 2019-20, Decade to Doorways (D2D) hosted a “Connect and Collaborate Cocktail Reception” in November at the Downingtown Country Club. The date commemorates the annual *National Hunger and Homelessness Awareness Week*. The event was to engage and network with Chester County community residents and human service organizations.

A brief video featured the services provided by D2D partners to four homeless individuals. These county residents were extremely grateful for the vital assistance they received to address their needs, and help them on a path to security and independence. After the video, D2D Administrator Rob Henry, who attended our September branch meeting, and other D2D staff, stressed that the D2D Partnership needs a tremendous amount of help and resources to continue necessary services.

Although Chester County is one of the wealthiest counties in Pennsylvania with a median annual household income of \$99,119, there are still many people who are suffering. Federal, state, and local resources alone have not eliminated homelessness in our county. Significant progress has been made to prevent and eliminate homelessness since D2D’s inception in 2011, but substantial work still needs to be done. Volunteering, providing housing, advocating, and donating are the main ways to achieve the goals.

Twelve members from our AAUW Branch attended and helped with the event by registering attendees, supervising the volunteer sign-up table, and offering support through their attendance. Cathy Palmquist deserves special recognition for the beautiful flower arrangements she created and transported to the reception. D2D greatly appreciated our contributions to the success of this event. (Note: this is just one of several activities to which our branch members are providing assistance.) Dolores Colligan, Assistant Director of the

Chester County Department of Community Development, which administers the D2D program, expressed her appreciation for the “AAUW Super Stars!”

Act Against Homelessness

On Sunday, November third, Grove Methodist Church presented a panel of representatives from four local agencies who are working to eliminate homelessness in our community. Three of our members, Kim Levan, Cathy Palmquist and Mimi Jones attended the discussion presented by Rob Henry from Decade to Doorways, Jennifer Lopez from Friends Association for Care and Protection of Children, Jessica Pendergast from Home of the Sparrow and Judy Jeffords-Homitz from Safe Harbor. Safe Harbor and Friends are two of the four organizations under the umbrella of Decade to Doorways we from the Chester County AAUW are supporting this year as our Gateway to Equity partners. Rob Henry and representatives from the other shelters we are supporting spoke to the branch at our September meeting.

Each of the shelters working with the homeless has its own unique mission. Safe Harbor helps single men and women, Friends works to find homes for families, and Home of the Sparrow works to help women leaving the shelter program. This organization also has help for homeless women between the ages of 50 to 64. Decade to Doorways is beginning a Street Outreach program this year as well as a Call Center to direct people to the right shelter for them.

The challenges facing these organizations are daunting, but all of these groups remain optimistic about the progress they are making, and, indeed, they are doing remarkable work. When asked what they needed most, there were some specific requests and some general needs. Home of the Sparrow needs items you cannot buy with food stamps, Friends need money, a car, gift cards from Wawa and Giant and household supplies, and Safe Harbor needs money, new winter coats but no socks! In general, all saw the need for safe affordable housing. In Coatesville, a two-bedroom apartment that rented for \$700 last year now is \$1000 a month, putting it out of reach for many people.

To help the homeless, all the representatives asked that citizens advocate with politicians to provide affordable housing in their communities by attending Borough Council meetings and writing and calling their representatives. Pressuring politicians to provide a livable wage for workers is also vital for them to be able to find a home near where they are employed. There are currently three bills in the PA House and Senate that will support the homeless, House Bill 955, Senate Bill 30 and Senate Bill 31. Please consider researching and supporting these bills.

We at AAUW will continue to support the homeless in our area through our Gateway to Equity partnership with Decade to Doorways.

Member News and Involvement / Items of Interest

GunSenseUs

GunSenseUs is a group that seeks common sense solutions to address gun violence. The organization recognizes all citizens' rights and responsibilities to work to reduce gun violence and to assure safe gun ownership. Members have crafted a three-part agenda entitled "Your Best B.E.T. for Gun Safety." The agenda has three goals:

(B) Background checks for every gun purchase

(E) Extreme risk protection order, a tool to enable family or law enforcement to request the temporary removal of a firearm

(T) Training before first firearm purchase, enhancing safety for the gun owner and those who will be exposed to the gun

Gun regulation occurs both at the state and federal level. Therefore, taking action requires knowing what legislation is being proposed and

the position of your specific elected officials. The U.S. House has passed both H.R.8, the Bipartisan Background Checks Act and H.R. 1112, the Enhanced Background Checks Act. Senator McConnell has blocked both bills from a vote. I am the organization's liaison to Chrissy Houlahan who supports both bills and has urged Senate action.

The Pennsylvania legislature also has pending bills addressing the B.E.T goals: (B) HB 673, SB 88; (E) HB 1075, SB 90; (T) HB 1753. Many of our local legislators are sponsors of these bills. Please check with your legislator. Direct contact with your legislator is more effective than signing generic petitions. Please visit the organization's website gunsenseus.org for more information about B.E.T. and the activities of GunSenseUs.

- Nurture these members through active Interest Groups, through monthly meetings with intellectual and social merit, and through member support.
- Sponsor at least one project per year with volunteers and with funds to promote Association and branch goals.
 - Sponsor at least one local scholarship per year for a nontraditional student
- Support programs for training and self-development of branch members to promote Association goals.
- Raise funds through community projects and member gifts to support Association goals.

Since its first meeting in 1881, AAUW has been a catalyst for change. Today, with more than 100,000 members, 1,000 branches, and 500 college and university partners, AAUW contributes to a more promising future and provides a powerful voice for women and girls—a voice that cannot and will not be ignored.
