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Letter from the President

60th Anniversary of West Chester-Chester County Branch

We are excited to announce that a branch committee is working diligently on creating a noteworthy celebration to commemorate our 60thbranch anniversary. We will start out with an anniversary themed cake in November before our general meeting. We will follow up with a separate anniversary party March 29th at William Penn Lounge. All additional details will be shared as soon as everything is finalized. Please save the date.

So how did we get here? The AAUW National roots go way back to 1881 when the founders, Marion Talbot and Ellen Richards, met in Boston with 15 alumnae representing eight colleges to discuss the needs of college educated women. Since then, AAUW has grown nationally to more than 170,000 members with 1,000 local branches and over 800 college and university partners like our own West Chester University. They have always focused on the hard questions, delving into educational, social, economic and political issues. In preparation for this article, I read up on National AAUW milestones from its infancy. Take a moment and explore our history on line and you will see the dynamic organization from which we are descended.

Our branch, the West Chester Branch, was established in 1959. President Charles S. Swope of West Chester State College pressed to have a branch of AAUW created for the West Chester area. An organizational meeting was held in the lounge of Old Main and it was unanimously voted into existence. A ceremony was held on Feb. 2, 1960 for the signing of our charter with 43 members. It was the fiftieth Pennsylvania branch of AAUW.

From that inauguration, we continue to promote equity for women and girls through advocacy, education and philanthropy through the many programs we sponsor. We are currently 88 members strong and continue to grow with a goal of reaching 100 by the end of our 60th year anniversary.

Remember when we all come together, it is amazing what we can accomplish! I think this quote sums up this sentiment very well: "The five separate fingers are five independent units. Close them and the fist multiplies strength. This is organization." James Cash Penney

Dr. Ireland: An Inspiring Example of Weaving Life and Art

At the October meeting our Chapter members enjoyed a fascinating presentation by Dr. Carol Ireland. in her talk, "Textiles, Travel, and Upcycling," Dr. Ireland, who holds a PhD in Chemistry, described how she discovered the art of weaving and wove it into her life as a scientist. She discovered the art of weaving when a graduate student, and upon retirement from Dupont, she founded a traveling group of weavers who have explored techniques of weaving and natural dyeing in far-flung places like Thailand, Peru, and Oaxaca.



Dr. Ireland showed examples of yarn dyed with natural materials, including black walnuts, flowers, and indigo. She showed examples of very detailed weavings using a technique called ikat, showing works she had collected from various cultures around the world, as well as the very fine weavings she did herself. She also

described how her interest expanded into handspinning and dyeing yarns with natural dyes. She also introduced the concept of upcycling, showing her works using scraps and unusual materials – even plastic bags, bicycle inner tubes, and a deconstructed cashmere sweater – in her weaving works.

Dr. Ireland is a member of WARP ("Weave a Real Peace"), which fosters a global network of enthusiasts who value the importance of textiles to grassroots economies. Through WARP she has explored indigenous weavings from around the world and helped bring women's work to market. She has seen Syrian refugees find a market – and peace – through their weaving, and seen rejuvenation of traditional basket weaving in Kenya.

CWYA (Community, Youth, & Women's Association)

CWYA (Community, Youth, & Women's Association) is the organization our AAUW chapter is supporting for November through our Gateway to Equity award to Decade to Doorways.

CWYA (Community, Youth, & Women's Association), located at 423 E. Lincoln Highway, Coatesville, has a long history of helping community residents in the Coatesville area. Their services include a homeless shelter for women and children; drug and alcohol rehabilitation programs for women; a community food cupboard; and family casework programs.

The Gateway Shelter offers emergency housing to women and children. At present there are eight women residents; the number of children varies, as does the length of stay. The Samara House program provides drug and alcohol rehabilitation services. The length of stay for participants varies, based on their insurance coverage. There is also a follow up program for clients who have returned to the community after stays in the CWYA shelter. The goal of CWYA is to eliminate economic, spiritual, and moral poverty in the area. CWYA endeavors to promote life stability.

In addition CWYA offers several community outreach programs. Twice a month they serve a community dinner. Clothing and household items are distributed periodically. A food cupboard also serves residents in the area. Volunteers are welcome to assist with the community programs. The following information from our chapter's LAPP Committee was handed out at the October meeting. The committee's first focus is Pay Equity. If you were at the meeting, you know you have homework to do prior to the November meeting (items 1 and 2). Links to the bills are included below; you won't have to google them. We'll do item #3 at the November meeting. Hope to see you then! And, no, the ninja did NOT make your homework disappear!

Branch Goal #2: Political Issues

Our first focus is **Pay Equity**. There are two bills, one in the PA Senate (SB 721) and one in the House (HB 850). The bills are comparable! Yay! These bills need to be passed by December 31, 2020, or we go back to the beginning. Here's what **you** need to do as a Chester County Branch Member:

- 1. Read each of the bills. Find out the sponsors and co-sponsors.
 - a. SB 721

The next Equal Pay Day is Tuesday, March 31, 2020. This date symbolizes how far into the year women must work to earn what men earned in the previous year.

Equal Pay Dates in 2019 in Pennsylvania

- Asian American Women's Equal Pay Day— Tuesday, March 5 (Asian Women v. White, non-Hispanic Men – \$0.85)
- All women's Equal Pay Day Tuesday,
 April 2 (Women overall v. Men overall \$0.80)
- White women's equal pay day Friday,
 April 19: (White, non-Hispanic Women v.
 White, non-Hispanic Men \$0.77)
- Moms' Equal Pay Day, usually the end of May or early June (will be determined at a later date)
- Black Women's Equal Pay Day Thursday, August 22 (Black Women v. White, non-Hispanic Men – \$0.61)
- Native Women's Equal Pay Day Monday, September 23 (Native Women v. White, non-Hispanic Men – \$0.58)

We Must Do MORE than just Celebrate the 100th Anniversary of Women's Suffrage

Throughout the Delaware Valley, women's organizations are well into their planning for a celebration of the 100th Anniversary of the 19th Amendment that granted women the right to vote. The long struggle for that right began in the mid-1800s and lasted until 1920 when the Amendment to the United States Constitution finally passed.


The upcoming year, 2020, will be a time of several celebrations: our branch will celebrate its 60th Anniversary with visiting dignitaries, speeches, and celebratory food. We could do the same kind of "celebration" for the upcoming 100th Anniversary of Suffrage, but we should do more! We who have had the benefit of a full education are the ones who should know, beyond any doubt, the importance of teaching others about this momentous time in U.S. History and about the women heroes who brought about this victory.

AAUW West Chester-Chester County is collaborating with several other women's organizations right here in the West Chester area to provide learning experiences about this absolutely critical passage of our right to vote. We who are members of the branch already know the importance of that passage, but many of the people with whom we come in contact have never heard the Women's Suffrage Story. Barbara Lathroum and Fran Pierce are working with other women's groups and we want to know:

- Who are the people you reach through your involvement in our branch?
- Have they ever heard the whole, true story of the fight for women's suffrage?
- What ways can you and your group think of to teach this important history?
- How can we make an impression on those who don't know this history so that the precious **right to vote** can hold new meaning for them?

At next month's meeting, Fran and Barb will be asking your Special Interest groups or committees what ideas you might have come up with. What ideas will you think of that could help to educate women and men, girls and boys, old and young, on the sacred struggle to vote?
