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#### Letter from the President

This past year has certainly tested the organization and the resolve of its members. We came through all the challenges with creativity and grace.

Last summer we moved forward with our Gateway to Equity winner and chose a shelter under the auspices of Decade to Doorways. The management of D2D came back with a request to help all of the shelters that met our criteria of assisting women and girls. That led us to helping four shelters instead of one. With the guidance of Mimi and Peggy, we organized our work to best meet this challenge, and surprised ourselves with the success we had. We supplied more items, provided more volunteer hours, and raised more money by far than we ever had in the past.

In January we became aware that we had been scammed out of money from our treasury. I was so proud of our members who rallied to support each other in this crisis. It reflected the understanding that we are all volunteers doing the best we can, and that is to be respected by everyone.

Having handled the scam, we were so excited to plan many lovely activities for the spring, including GETT, the fund-raiser for the Domestic Violence Center, and our own Anniversary Celebration. Everything was organized and ready to roll. Then came word of virus, and none of us could have imagined the impact it would have on our lives. Once we understood that we would not be able to get together as a group, many feared the worst. To my delight Zoom came to the rescue! We now have our book groups, Mah Jongg, and the Stitchers meetings on-line. The Board meetings and even the Annual meeting were conducted through Zoom, maintaining a sense of normalcy for our members. Should the pandemic continue through the summer, we know that we can continue to meet virtually in the fall.

I'd like to give recognition to the officers, the committee chairs, and the special interest chairs who have worked so hard this year to bring wonderful programs and activities to the branch. Through all the challenges they have continued to provide leadership to the organization and to serve the community.

My deepest gratitude goes to Anne, our Co-President, for being a dependable, sensible, and organized officer, as well as a good friend. Anne and I spent countless hours planning the multitude of activities that an organization of our size runs. She will be an excellent lead president in the coming year!

# Branch again selects WCU Resource Pantry for Gateway to Equity Award

For the third time, branch members have selected the West Chester University Resource Pantry to receive the Gateway to Equity Award for 2020-21. The annual award honors an individual, group or organization that has shown by action and philosophy the promotion of the AAUW mission to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and research.

The Resource Pantry mission is to eliminate barriers to degree completion for students with

financial need by providing access to resources, while empowering students to learn independent living skills, and achieve long-term stability.

Pam Frontino, Associate Director of Service-Learning and Volunteer Programs at West Chester University, manages the pantry. With a bachelor's degree in political science from Susquehanna University, and a master's in (continued on next page)

sustainable international development from Brandeis, she is also involved with the WCU Sustainability Committee.

Thanking AAUW for its support, she commented "the program has grown from a small closet of food supplies to four rooms of dedicated space at the university, serving over 200 students per week. The pantry is testament to the support of the entire

community," she added, explaining that the county food bank, churches and community

organizations, such as AAUW, regularly contribute non-perishable items, fresh produce, clothing items, and monetary donations.

The pantry is open to all undergraduate students at WCU, regardless of their need level. No appointment is necessary, and walk-ins are welcome at any time during the hours of operation. "Student food insecurity has been growing, not only at WCU but at campuses across the country," said Frontino. According to the pantry's 2017-18 annual report, almost 32 percent of students on campus have food insecurity.

"The goal of the program is that when students graduate, they will have the tools to succeed," she said, noting that educational workshops on financial literacy, food preparation, applying for government assistance programs, and social service aids are provided in partnership with financial, career development and other programs at WCU.

"With the campus currently on lockdown, we are now just able to provide packages of prepared items," she said, "and we don't yet know if students will be on campus in the fall."

### Decade to Doorways Expresses Thanks

Lauren Baker of Chester County's Decade to Doorways thanked the chapter for its support this past year.

Lauren Baker, staff member of Chester County's Decade to Doorways (D2D) program offered "tremendous gratitude" to our branch and its members for assistance to the county's homeless prevention program, speaking at our virtual "May Banquet." Decade to Doorways was the recipient of our chapter's Gateway to Equity Award for 2019-2020. She noted that beginning

with support of their "Be the Key" reception, "Your organization and its members made a

significant impact on our service providers," she said, citing positive comments she received from Jennifer Lopez, director of Friends Association for the Care and Protection of Children. "Your recent generous monetary donation to CYWA (Community Youth and Women's Alliance shelter) is most appreciated, as well as your monthly endeavors on behalf of the three other shelters to whom you provided support. What you've done and what you do is truly appreciated. It's been a privilege to work with you," she said in closing.

Co-president Eva Kaufmann mentioned the funds raised in our upcoming "Teapot Fundraiser" will go to help with the needs of the homeless who are in hotels due to the shortage of shelters.

### Alice Lawson Scholarship Awarded to Non-Traditional Student

"If there is a single word that describes the Alice Lawson Scholarship winner, Mykia Bridgett," said Deb Liczwek, co-chair of the scholarship committee, along with Diane Dougherty, "it's 'determined'." Mykia, who received the \$1,500 scholarship awarded by our branch at our May meeting started her journey in higher education in 1993.

Marriage and children interrupted her schooling, and for a time, she fostered children in addition to raising her own children and adopting a foster child who is now 15 years old. Still she did not give up her dream of pursuing higher education. "I wanted my children to see me succeed," she said. Mykia enrolled in Community College of Philadelphia, earning her AA degree with high honors in 2009. That fall, she enrolled at Temple University in the Bachelor of Social Work program, but she was unable to continue because she had reached the maximum in allowed loans.

Again, she persevered, working to clear her debt. In 2019, Mykia enrolled at West Chester University, where her academic adviser rates her as exceptional in all areas: initiative, motivation, reliability, creativity, leadership, communications skills and intellectual abilities. Her advisor praised Mykia for her "extraordinary social justice and advocacy skills," in addition to her "strong commitment to and knack for academic excellence." Her experience as a mother and foster mother have shaped her educational path and choice of career, Mykia explains. Her hope is to provide a group home for teens who are about to "age out" of the foster system, but who have few plans for their futures.

"I am so grateful and emotional to have someone believe in me," she said, upon receiving the scholarship. "I was ready to give up."

The scholarship, awarded to a non-traditional female student, is named for the late Alice Lawson, a lifelong AAUW member who joined AAUW branches wherever she

and her husband moved. "She had a special empathy for young women who faced financial challenges in pursuing a college degree," said Lawson's daughter. "She loved teaching and helping others." Alice was offered an opportunity to enroll in college by a nun at Seton College, when her family did not have money for college after educating her four older siblings, and the Depression came along.

Mykia's daughter is a student at the University of Virginia on a full academic scholarship and is scheduled to graduate in 2021. "Even if my daughter beats me to the punch and graduates first, I will proceed." adds Mykia. "After graduation, I hope to pay it forward to someone else," she told AAUW members. "We are pleased to have had a part in Mykia's journey," said Deb.

# Awards Presented to Members at May Meeting

Another important feature of the annual meeting is the recognition of chapter members for their contributions with awards as voted on by members. Anne Anderko noted that flowers and certificates were brought to the awardees the day before the meeting, and she recognized the following awards:

She was especially recognized for her overseeing the community outreach program.

Member Making A Difference – to Trish Alfano This award is made in recognition of recent term contributions by an unsung member who represents the spirit of being there to lend a helping hand. Trish was recognized for her creative fund raising and work on the handbook.

#### **Outstanding Branch Member** – to Eva Kaufmann

This award is presented for meritorious service in over multiple years to the chapter and the community.
