

Alice Lawson Scholarship Winner



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Mykia Bridgett received the \$1,500 scholarship awarded annually by the West Chester-Chester County branch of the American Association of University Women (AAUW). The scholarship, awarded to a non-traditional female student, is named for the late Alice Lawson, a lifelong AAUW member who joined AAUW branches wherever she and her husband moved. Alice was offered an opportunity to enroll in college by a nun at Seton College, when her family did not have money for college after educating her four older siblings, and the Depression came along.

Mykia started her journey in higher education in 1993. After marriage and children (including a foster child) interrupted her schooling, she returned to school, earning an AA from Community College of Philadelphia. While enrolled in the Temple University Bachelor in Social Work program, she reached the maximum in allowed loans. Again, she persevered, working to clear her debt and enrolled at West Chester University in 2019. "I wanted my children to see me succeed," she said. Her hope is to provide a group home for teens who are about to "age out" of the foster system, but who have few plans for their futures. "I am so grateful and emotional to have someone believe in me," she said, upon receiving the scholarship. "I was ready to give up."

Gateway to Equity Award



WCU Resource Pantry Receives Gateway to Equity Award

For the third time, branch members have selected the West Chester University Resource Pantry to receive the Gateway to Equity Award for 2020-21. The annual award *honors an individual, group or organization that has shown by action and philosophy the promotion of the AAUW mission to advance equity for women and girls through advocacy, education, and research.*

The Resource Pantry mission is to eliminate barriers to degree completion for students with financial need by providing access to resources, while empowering students to learn independent living skills, and achieve long-term stability. The program has grown from a small closet of food supplies to four rooms of dedicated space at the university, serving over 200 students per week.

Pam Frontino, Associate Director of Service-Learning and Volunteer Programs at West Chester University, manages the pantry. With a bachelor's degree in political science from Susquehanna University, and master's in sustainable international development from Brandeis, she is also involved with the WCU Sustainability Committee




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"TREMENDOUS GRATITUDE"
