November Meeting: Wendy Summer gave "An Outsider's View from Inside"




Wendy Summer, founder of ZAANHA, spoke to our chapter via Zoom on the topic of "Afghanistan: Why I Keep Going Back." Wendy described how her first trip in 2006, with an organization that was setting up business owners to help teach business skills in post-conflict countries, led to her returning to the country for a total of 16 times. She recounted how her experiences led to the formation of three programs to help secure education for underserved children, especially girls, in a country suffering from extensive illiteracy. Ultimately, this led Wendy to establish ZAANHA to help fund the programs.

She described the warmth with which she was received by Afghans and told how she found her growing appreciation of the hardness of life there, even for those educated and starting businesses. For example, Wendy made contact with a woman with a dress shop and found herself offering to pay half the costs for school for their daughters when the family could only afford to send their son to private school. She saw the street children who were fortunate enough to be getting at least a marginal education unable to do their assignments because they couldn't afford pencil and paper like other kids. Despite the importance

of education, with the bloody Afghan civil war beginning in 1989 and then the advent of the Taliban in



1996, the education system ground to a halt. Today the majority of Afghan men and women are illiterate.

Wendy started ZAANHA, (which means women in the Dari language), whose mission became sending illiterate Afghan working street boys and girls to school. ZAANHA's programs are funded by the sales of beautiful scarves and shawls made primarily by master craftspeople in Nepal and India. Per the website, "ZAANHA's merchandise is meticulously hand made

from fine natural materials including cashmere, silk, linen and cotton. Many (CONTINUED on next page)

of our artisans still practice age old techniques resulting in distinctive products of remarkable beauty and quality." Wendy described three programs funded through ZAANHA:

- The ZAANHA Fund came into being after Wendy learned that thousands of indigent Afghan children were unable to go to school because they had to work on the streets to support their families. A sponsorship program provided the \$30 / month to support the family with the money the child would earn on the street so they had the time to go to school.
- Rumi school Wendy's contact took her to this school, where she met the founder Mirweis. They started a private school program to identify children with promise, and she paid to help them.
- Silk business Wendy discovered the long and storied tradition of making silk; she learned from Nasima how girls in one village wanted to learn to use computers, but they could not go to Kabul to learn without male escorts. Wendy started raising money, went to India, obtained fine cashmere scarves, and uses portions of sales to raise money to send kids to school in Afghanistan. Nasima's pilot for 6 students led to over 100 girls being taught by

I have used a library theme to redecorate my dining room. Over 600 books, all donated by AAUW members, line the perimeter of the room. They will find a new home next week when I take them to the Laundromat Library League's storage site in West Chester. The Laundromat Library League (LLL) thanks you so very much for the multitude of books the West Chester-Chester County Branch has given to build and replenish the supply of books that 270 laundromats need. Each book box in each site has 50 to 60 books that cover reading levels from age 2 to 16.

In addition to the overwhelming response to requests for books, branch members have also given \$590 in financial support to the LLL. Those

generous funds will enable the LLL to buy books in Spanish and those that feature minority characters. Book donations for these books do not meet the demand, so the LLL is very thankful for the opportunity to purchase them.

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the LLL, I thank you for your tremendous generosity. West Chester Public Library Presents Two Holiday Tours

West Chester Public Library and presenting sponsor CTDI invite you to have double the fun on the library's two big tours for 2021: the Holiday Home Tour and the Holiday Door Tour. All proceeds from the tours will benefit the West Chester Public Library.

Holiday Home Tour

Returning for the 10th year, the perennially popular Holiday Home Tour will take place on Saturday, **December 4, from 10 am to 3 pm** and will showcase seven homes decked out for the holidays on the North side of the borough. Ranging from petite to grand, Victorian to mid-century modern, the homes blend original details with modern updates and display the homeowners' art, collectibles, and antiques. Holiday Home Tour attendees are also invited to tour the West Chester Friends Meeting House and will receive free admission to the Chester County History Center and a complimentary Holiday Raffle ticket.

Tickets for the Holiday Home Tour are \$40 each and are available online and at the library main desk. To protect the health of our Holiday Home Tour homeowners, attendees must provide proof of COVID vaccination with a vaccine card or its image either on the day of the Tour or the day before. Tour attendees may present their vaccination proof at the

library on December 3 from 10 am to noon or December 4 from 9 am to noon, or alternatively, at the first home they visit on the Tour.

Holiday Door Tour

The family-friendly Holiday Door Tour, which started as socially distanced replacement for the Holiday Home Tour in 2020, is coming back this year Saturday, December 4 through Sunday, **December 19.** This self-guided event will feature dozens of West Chester doors and porches decorated by their owners in holiday finery. Since it takes place outdoors, no masking or vaccination proof is required for the Door Tour. To attend, make a donation of any size to the library's Holiday Appeal. Donors will receive Door Tour maps, an entry in our Holiday Raffle, and a list of scavenger hunt items to look for among the decorations. Tour-goers can go on any or all of several scavenger hunts for specific items among the decorations in different areas of the borough.

Holiday Raffle prizes include a framed print of "The Reading Room" by acclaimed West Chester artist John Suplee, a lottery ticket tree, a book-page holiday wreath, tickets to Longwood Gardens, and tickets for next year's Holiday Home Tour.
