Letter from the President

My mom always said time moves faster as one ages. I don't want to admit to getting old, but – WOW – where did the summer go? I hate to have it end. In part, this is because I am handwringing about how to make a difference in our topsy-turvy political world before the mid-term elections. There seems to be a confluence of many disturbing policy changes being put forward that have and will continue to limit people's rights, especially the rights of women.

I know that most of us have lived through the time before Roe v. Wade. We may know how it felt not to be allowed to establish a line of credit. Some of us may have lost sleep over the possibility of an unwanted child. How do we share this with the young women of today, who up until June 24, 2022 had a legal right to control whether or not they choose to carry through on a pregnancy? We must work to make sure that Pennsylvania does not regulate women's bodies. Please share any ideas you may have to get the vote out – especially for young women! It is urgent!

Nancy and I hope to see you on September 14th when we return to meeting in Grove Methodist Church. Beryl Goldman and Jane McDowell have a superb line-up of speakers for the year. The first branch meeting this month will educate (or in some cases reacquaint) members about the history of the scholarships and awards that our chapter offers. And why we are focused on specific

initiatives. It is a chance to congratulate our branch on the amazing work we do! Beyond September, a full program of presentations scheduled is listed in our handbook and posted on our website. All sound engaging and interesting.

Once again, the Handbook that Trish Alfano and Anne Anderko compiled is a wonderful resource. 

Harriet Jarosh Environmental Education Fund Recognized on Heart of Uwchlan Sign

A grant from the Harriet Jarosh Environmental Education Fund was recognized on a new educational sign unveiled at the Heart of Uwchlan Wetland Garden at the Uwchlan EAC's June event, "Spring into Summer." The Heart of Uwchlan project is led by AAUW member Toni Gorkin. Its goal is to introduce native plants to the Uwchlan Township office park and to educate the public on environmentally beneficial gardening practices. The grant was made to the project in 2019 and had a significant impact in getting the gardens launched. The Wetland Garden is one of three gardens project volunteers have planted in the park. The others are a Milkweed Garden and a Streamside Garden.

The gala event at the West Chester Historical Society provided information on several garden projects and on the Green Team's beautification of West Chester with pollinator gardens in the city.

Lit III Enjoys Lemon Cake; Here's the Recipe

At Lit III's June 7 Planning Meeting, Carol Haaf, who hosted, served a Lemon Cake that was especially delicious. The group wanted to have the recipe shared, so here it is! Enjoy!

Mix cake mix, Jello, oil, water and eggs. Pour in greased and floured 9 x 13 inch pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Test after 30. I have found in my oven that it never takes the full 45 minutes. Remove from oven and pierce cake with a fork.

Lemon cake recipe from Carol Haaf

1 box yellow cake mix (I have used lemon cake mix also) 1 (3) ounce pkg lemon Jello 3/4 cup oil 3/4 cup cold water

4 eggs

2 cups powdered sugar 2 and 1/2 lemons - juice and rind

Combine sugar, rind and lemon juice. Pour on cake while cake is still hot.


