She married and had four children, three sons and one daughter. She was a stay-at-home mom until her voungest child was ten and she decided to go to college at West Chester University. After graduating with a degree in elementary education, she taught kindergarten and went on to get a M.Ed. After a couple years, she decided to change careers and studied at WCU for an MSW. She worked in the Nephrology Division at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia as the kidney transplant social worker until she retired. She has always been physically active and when she turned 50, she began competing in triathlons and continues to train and compete. About 18 months ago, she began volunteering at the Chester County Community Warehouse Project. She loves adventurous traveling. Her daughter and family live in Vermont and her sons and families live nearby. She has eight fabulous grandchildren.

November Meeting: Thistle Hills

Speaker Carol Hart Metzker used poignant props shoes from a theoretical victim of human trafficking. "Anna" – to demonstrate the typical path from childhood trauma to being trafficked. She also showed the potential transformation of victims to positive self-image and

better life path through the intervention at the Thistle Hills facility.

Ms. Metzker explained what the facts (versus myths) are behind how girls end up trafficked. The story starts as early as age 4-7, with some kind of exploitation or trauma in the home. In school, such a child often displays disruptive behavior, may be branded a "troublemaker" for acting out, and self-esteem deteriorates. In teen

years such girls in turmoil turn to drugs to selfmedicate and may become addicted. They are looking for love, a need which a trafficker preys upon, as a "Romeo." A girl who is addicted and sold cannot really consent to sex, Ms. Metzger points out. And the life she leads is in reality not at all the "glamorous" myth.

Thistle Hills is Chester County's only residential program specifically designed for women survivors of human trafficking. For two years it provides for each of two residents a safe home. It not only provides heat, light, safety -but even more important, a family-like place to feel loved, build self-esteem, get mental and medical health, learn communication, and develop positive life skills. Close to transportation and community resources, residents can start to get schooling and jobs.

Although it can serve few women at a time, Ms. Metzger pointed out that Thistle Hills is part of an extended community of resources in the region that provide support to victims of trafficking.

Criteria for Harriet Jarosh Environmental Education Grant Applications Clarified

The Harriet Jarosh Environmental Education Grant was established in memory of Harriet Jarosh, a long-time member and leader of the West Chester-Chester County affiliate of AAUW. She was passionate about supporting and preserving the environment. Upon her death, her family made a contribution to the affiliate, and it was decided to utilize the funds to support environmental education projects. AAUW West Chester-Chester County has received additional generous support from its members and the fund is now invested so that it can remain viable in perpetuity. Each year, the AAUW West Chester-Chester County board of officers makes a determination as to which project(s) should be supported. Current grants range from \$250 - \$500 per year.

Based on recent discussion, the Board has clarified the requirements for applying for a grant, and the Affiliate website has been updated. Requests for funds must meet the following requirements:

- Project must focus on efforts toward increasing awareness and understanding of current environmental issues.
- Project must be conducted in Chester County.
- Project must provide for maximum inclusivity and accessibility.
- Requested funds may not be used to pay salaries.
- Recognize the support of AAUW in project materials

Applicants for grants must submit a one-page description of the project, addressing the criteria listed above, to: Nancy Dore (ncdore@gmail.com) by February 1 of the year in which funds are requested.
