Welcome to the February Newsletter!

I saw the stage production of SUFFS in New York in January, which left me alternately clapping or crying, as the musical focuses on the largely unknown social pioneers who emerged in the seven-year run-up to the passage of the 19th Amendment. These were feisty and strategic women who chafed at the previous generation of suffragists unwilling to use disruptive forms of activism. It has completed its run in New York, but it will begin a national tour. As a woman and AAUW member I highly recommend you see it to be reminded of the struggle women have gone through for the right to vote.

And our fight as women continues today as we focus on the right to control our own bodies, push for equal pay in the work place, bring an end to workplace sexual harassment, and advocate for educational policies that support and protect programs that meet the needs of girls and women in elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education. Let our mission be known, we need AAUW now more than ever.

Welcome to New Member the Honorable Judge FREDDA LEWIS MADDOX



Judge Fredda Lewis
Maddox is the first
African American
woman to serve on the
Chester County Court
of Common Pleas since
the founding of the
County by William
Penn in 1682. Her
public service career
began in law
enforcement as a

Pennsylvania State Trooper in Chester County. Her career advanced and she was subsequently hired by the Pennsylvania Office of the Attorney General, where she served as a Narcotics Agent in the Bureau of Narcotics.

After attending evening classes at Widener University Law School, Judge Lewis Maddox later joined the Defender Association of Philadelphia where she served as a child advocate attorney for over a decade. In addition, she has served as a staff attorney at the Domestic Violence Center of Chester County, securing the protection of and providing a voice to victims of domestic violence, and as an associate attorney at Rovito Law, LLC in West Chester, Pennsylvania, a highly regarded family law practice. Known for her tireless advocacy of children she was appointed by the Chester County Court of Common Pleas to handle child welfare cases in Chester County.

Before being elected to the Court of Common Pleas, in November 2019, Judge Fredda Lewis Maddox was elected Sheriff of Chester County. Her election made her the first African American woman to be sworn in as an elected Sheriff in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

In addition to a law degree, Judge Lewis Maddox holds a Master of Science in Public Administration from West Chester University and a Bachelor of Science in Criminal Justice from Edinboro State College.

Welcome New Member JUDY SAUNDERS

Judy grew up forty miles west of Boston,
Massachusetts. After high school she received an
associate's degree in medical secretarial science
from the Salter Secretarial School in Worcester,
MA. Upon graduation, she worked in dermatology
and general surgery medical practices. She
returned to further her education by obtaining an
ADN from Kenosha Technical College, in
Kenosha, WI. She worked as an RN at the Baylor
School of Orthopedic Surgery in Houston,
TX. After moving to PA, she worked for
physicians in Pediatrics, OB/GYN, and
dermatology practices.

After twenty years in medicine, she decided to change her profession to honor a lifelong dream to become a teacher. She graduated with a B.S. in Elementary Education from Cabrini University, in Radnor, PA., in 1992 and a M.A. in Education from Cabrini University in 1998 and completed post graduate studies at St. Joseph's University in 2006-2007.

She became an elementary teacher with the Haverford School District and taught fifth and second grade for twenty-four years. After retiring, she moved to Hershey's Mill to become part of an active adult community. She has been an educational assistant and museum guide at the Chester County History Center for the last six years and a tour guide at Historic Sugartown for the last four years.

For the past six years, she has been attending the Lifelong Learning classes offered by Widener University. She enjoys gardening, biking, walking, book club and traveling. She always looks forward to returning to her New England roots where many family members still reside.



A Reference guide for choosing a recipient for the following AAUW Awards - (also found in your handbook)

MEMBER MAKING A DIFFERENCE - recognition of recent term contributions by an unsung hero who exemplifies the spirit of AAUW.

- *Any member may nominate an awardee to create a slate of nominees and will be asked to provide a brief rationale indicating the reason for their nomination. Members will vote on the slate of nominees to determine the final recipient of the award.
- *A person cannot receive both the Member Making a Difference and Peg Anderson Award in the same year.
- *This award will be presented at the May banquet.
- *This award may not be repeated within 3 years.

PEG ANDERSON AWARD - longstanding member who has served in many capacities over the years and **continues to work** in the background to inspire and support those who are now leaders and members.

- *Any member may nominate an awardee to create a slate of nominees, and will be asked to provide a brief rationale indicating the reason for their nomination. The board will make the final selection of the awardee.
- *A person cannot receive both the Member Making a Difference and Peg Anderson award in the same year.
- *This award will be presented at the May banquet.
- *This award may not be repeated within 3 years.

GATEWAY TO EQUITY AWARD - individual or organization that has shown by action and philosophy the promotion of the AAUW mission.

- *Any member may nominate an individual or organization and provide specific details and documentation regarding the type of support requested.
- *Board reviews the nominees and prepares a slate of no more than 5 nominees based upon the best matches with our ability to support and align with our mission.
- *Members vote on the slate.

The Laundromat Library League (LLL) keeps growing. We now have 286 sites in 34 states plus 3 laundromats in Guam. We have over 930 volunteers and supporters who serve as stewards, lead book drives, donate through their companies, help sort and organize books, attach LLL labels to our books, purchase multicultural and Spanish books, and help in other ways. We are grateful that members of the West Chester-Chester County AAUW affiliate serve as volunteers. One new AAUW member has recently offered to contact a local laundromat and serve as a steward. Community members and organizations generously donate books and financial support, but the need for books continues as we expand the number of our sites.

January Meeting: Chiwoneso Tinago-Shamaki

At January's Zoom meeting, we heard about our affiliate member Chiwoneso Tinago-Shamaki's transformational journey to higher education and the very important role AAUW played in empowering her as an educated woman, an academic professor, and a mentor to young women.

Chiwo described how expectations for her, as a girl



in Zimbabwe, were low, but her parents ensured she and her sister got an education. Coming to the US. she achieved a BS in Psychology at William Carey University, then earned an MA in Public Health at the University of

Southern Mississippi. She surmounted many challenges along the way. After working in Zimbabwe educating in public health, she returned to the US for doctoral studies at the University of

South Carolina. There she received an AAUW international fellowship, which was integral for paying for her doctoral tuition in her third year, enabling her to travel to Zimbabwe to finish her PhD dissertation research. Her studies were focused on the influences on the health of pregnant women, a subject she has pursued in further research, education programs, and mentoring of young women students.

Chiwo is now a tenured Professor at West Chester University, in the Department of Public Health Sciences. She is Chair of WCU's Global Initiatives Committee. As Program Director for the Certificate in Global Health she has developed a 12-course online virtual Global Health certificate program. She has focused on health issues across the world especially for women, and best practices to address them. She supports students, for example, with World Health Organization Simulations in London and elsewhere. Her research and her teaching and her mentoring – her life's work -- What can be done to reduce maternal mortality?
