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### Letter from the Presidents

"When I dare to be powerful, to use my strength in the service of my vision, then it becomes less and less important whether I am afraid."—Audre Lorde

Hello Ladies and Happy Spring!

I will be totally honest with you, I have tried to write the President's letter 3 times and been stopped by the ever-changing landscape of our country. The assault on government institutions which monitor our safety, health, national security, air travel, legal system and our financial system. The loss of jobs for thousands of people, trying to erase transpeople from existence. The devastating impact of wiping clear our history of anyone not a white male. Bullying everyone into believing DEI is a disease that has infected our nation. I have had to gather my thoughts and focus on what concerns us as AAUW members; our mission of supporting women and girls.

We as women, no matter the age, race, gender, sex, culture or religion have been impacted by the denying of women and girls access to health care. Programs that protect women's right to be safe from domestic violence and sexual assault have been defunded. Programs designed to protect women's employment have ended and women have been fired from positions of authority. In short, an assault on women during Women's History month, a month when we celebrate the women who came before us, in all walks of life.

And this week, we learned the federal Department of Education is being eliminated. The department that monitors funding to support school districts serving students from poor communities and students with disabilities, enforcement for student civil rights protects, like Title IX, which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex in schools that receive federal funding. We need to keep a close eye on how this might affect higher education. These are areas impacting AAUW. In an email you received information from AAUW National on how you might support AAUW's efforts with these crucial areas.

As members of WCCC AAUW we all share in the belief that women and girls should be provided equal pay, workplace fairness, increased support for and protection of programs that meet the needs of girls and women in elementary, secondary, and postsecondary education, including strong promotion of science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM), climates free from sexual harassment and the ability to seek higher education. And this is not just a national fight but a state fight also as you have been reading in the PA Public Policy notes you have been sent.

Now, more than ever, our branch should focus on what we can do as a local organization to support women and girls. One of these ways can be on the committee working on the selected priority from the survey sent by Beryl Goldman, Co-President: Adequate and equitable funding for and access to quality public education, including early childhood education, for all students. Or perhaps you would like to be our Public Policy liaison to the PA Public Policy committee. Or perhaps you would like to be on the fundraising committee discussing and implementing ideas to not only raise awareness but funds for our supported interests. Or you can voice your idea on how to advocate for issues supporting women and girls. One thing is for sure, the support of you, our members, is important.

One way you have supported our branch has been the contributions to our 2024-25 Gateway to Equity winner: Maternal and Child Health Consortium. Thank you! Don't forget about our Maternity Care Basket Assembly party on April 23rd and the May collection of baby care items. The selection for our 2025-26 winner will be sent via a survey. Please take the time to think about the selections and how we as a branch and you as a member might be able to support them.

Sandy Claus was born and raised on an Iowa cattle farm and attended Iowa State University. She graduated with a degree in Leisure Services (Recreation) and accepted a position in the Recreation Department at Woodward State

Hospital for the Mentally Retarded. Within a year, she had moved to the Volunteer Department which set the course for the rest of her life.

A job transfer for her husband took them to Chicago where she began her non-profit career as the Executive Director of the Arlington Heights United Way. Several years later they were transferred again to the Philadelphia area, and she joined the Junior Saturday Club in Wayne and was an active volunteer for Surrey Services for Seniors, chairing their signature fundraising event. Soon after, she was hired as the Development Director for Daemion House.

While she was employed at Daemion House, a good friend asked her to join the founding board for PA Home of the Sparrow. She spent several years on the Board and is proud of the groundwork they laid for the organization it has become.

In 1998, Great Valley School District created a unique position overseeing all District business partnerships, volunteers, and service-learning projects. Building a program from scratch was exciting and allowed her the opportunity to harness all her creative talents and learn a wide variety of new skills. While in that role, she served on several non-profit boards including the Great Valley Senior Center, Okehocking Nature Center, and Girls Star.

A decade later, she was able to take those skills to Phoenixville Area School District as their Director of Communications and Community Relations. During her tenure in Phoenixville, she was on the Phoenixville Chamber's Board of Directors, Phoenixville Affordable Housing Council, the Community Coalition Board, and Phoenixville Hospital's Healthy Women.

She retired in 2022, and she and her husband relocated to a home in Hershey's Mill. Upon retirement, she joined the board of Human Services, Inc. and she is actively involved with Ann's Heart in Phoenixville, working with their donor relations and corporate volunteer opportunities.

## March Brunch Speaker: Ajla Glavasevic


Our guest speaker at the March brunch meeting was Ajla Glavasevic; Ajla serves on the board of AAUW PA as the Diversity Officer in charge of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion.

Ajla recounted how her family immigrated from Bosnia to the United States under refugee status in 1995. She received her J.D. at the University of Cincinnati College of Law and has a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration, concentrating on Financial Analysis, from the University at Buffalo, where she also competed as a D1 heptathlete on a national level. Ajla shared her love of sports and her experience as a member of the USA Women's Bobsled Team.

Ajla was an Associate at a general practice law firm, where much of her work focused on corporate clients, as well as litigation, immigration matters, labor and employment, and criminal defense. She now serves as Deputy General Counsel & Global Data Privacy Officer of a global

chemical manufacturing company in Conshohocken, PA, where she leads the Data Privacy organization, advises on business matters, drafts and reviews contracts, and provides legal support and leadership in a variety of corporate tasks. She's married to an Austrian National. Ajla is a mother to a 5-year-old son, Julius, and a 3-year-old daughter, Philippa.

The app allows the user to select from a number of issues and then provides a sample script for calling the appropriate elected officials. [EDITOR'S NOTE: Affiliates should have received an extensive and informative email from **Gloria L. Blackwell, AAUW Chief Executive Officer,** in response to the administration's Executive Order to dismantle the U.S. Department of Education. Your newsletter editor is including the following from that email.]

"While only Congress has the authority to abolish the Department, this order is the latest in a series of attacks on student rights, educational equity, and civil rights enforcement. Read our statement here.
