Leslie Holt will speak on her organization, how it was formed, and the work they do with children and their families.

A Child's Light provides expedited mental health support for children and adolescents, ages 2 to 18, who have experienced severe trauma. Following best practices and funding pre-licensed and licensed therapists with trauma informed perspective and training, children receive the resources and tools to help them shift their severe trauma experiences to be a part of their past and not a part of their future.

Letter from the Presidents

If you are anything like us, you enjoy learning some fun facts in America's history, particularly to those referring to women. Here are some really cool and significant dates highlighted about women that occurred during November according to the International Women's History Alliance.

November 1, 1848 — The New England Female Medical School opens, the first medical school for women.

November 6, 2018 — Peggy Flanagan, a citizen of the white Earth Nation, a native American activist and a community organizer became the first female Native American elected lieutenant governor of Minnesota.

November 8, 1910 — The state of Washington passes constitutional amendment to guarantee woman suffrage.

November 8, 1984 — Dr. Anna Fisher, a physician on the shuttle Discovery, became the first American mother and third American woman to fly into space.

November 11, 1979 — Bethune Museum and Archives opens in Washington, D.C. as a center for African-American women's history, honoring Mary McLeod Bethune.

November 11, 1993 — Vietnam Women's memorial is dedicated in Washington, D.C. after being conceived by former army combat nurse Diane Carlson Evans and sculpted by Glenna Goodacre to honor the 265,000 women who voluntarily served during the Vietnam era.

November 23, 1938— Mother Francis Xavier Cabrini is beatified, the first American woman citizen to become a saint.

November 14, 1903 — The U.S. Women's Trade Union League is established.

November 14, 1946 — Emily Greene Balch, cofounder of the Women's International League for Peace and Freedom, is award the Nobel Peace Prize. November 28, 1881 — The first organization meeting is held for the predecessor group to the American Association of University Women (AAUW)

<u>November 30</u> — Native Women's Equal Pay Day when we recognize the wide gap in earnings between native women and white, non-Hispanic men...55 cents for every \$1.00.

Each of these occurrences is significant as it represents a major milestone for women, laying the foundation for all that lies ahead. Interesting to note that as far back as 1881, women recognized the need to form a collaboration from which they could celebrate each other's achievements and recognize meaningful ways in which they could separately, and together, make a difference in the lives of women of future generations.

This early mission of enhancing the trajectory for women and girls continues to flourish today.

We are thankful for the opportunities afforded us through AAUW. And, while unsettling issues continue with new ones arising each day, we continue to make significant inroads, albeit slowly. Sure there are setbacks, but we are resilient, knowing we have each other to work alongside.

Please join us on Wednesday, November 12th at 6:30 pm at Grove Methodist Church to hear from Leslie Holt, the Executive Director of A Child's Light, an organization that serves under-resourced children by helping them recover from traumatic experiences. She will share with us how the organization supports the children and their families.



Christine Brown Speaks at October Meeting: Citizen Advocacy of Chester County

Christine Brown is the Program Coordinator for Citizen Advocacy of Chester County, a group started over 40 years ago in Phoenixville. The mission of Citizen Advocacy of Chester County is to provide advocacy for opportunity, protection from harm, sponsorship into community life, friendship, and justice for isolated people living with a disability.

Christine was originally a music teacher in Oxford, after earning her BA from West Chester University. She earned her Master's degree in Education from Wilmington University and was serving as a principal when COVID hit. She decided that she needed to make a career change. (Having a two-year old son didn't help matters!) As a principal, special needs students were always her passion. It was a natural switch to join Citizen Advocacy, a group that works with individuals of all ages with special needs.



Christine's talent is in matching volunteers with the special needs individuals. She talked about several of these matches and explained that matches are checked once a week at first, then less often as it becomes apparent that the match will succeed. The organization is small, with only two full-time and two part-time employees. However, the work they do is amazing and significant.

LAPP (Legislation and Public Policy)

The November election may have come and gone by the time you read this note. My hope is that you voted, and that you stood up and spoke out! AAUW has signed on to more than 100 letters and facilitated thousands of messages to Congress, as of this date. AAUW continues to support education priorities such as addressing harassment and bullying in schools and increasing Pell Grants; and economic security issues like pay equity, and paid family and medical leave.

With the government shut down, the Federal Government has decimated the Special Needs section of the Department of Education. It is important that we stand up and speak out for schools and for those children and families who need help to cope with their disabilities.

Laundromat Library League

The Laundromat Library League is fortunate to have some generous donors. On October 23rd, WHYY had a special challenge that benefits both public radio and the LLL. WHYY will receive an extra donation of \$10,000 if a certain number of donations are received by the end of the day. If the challenge was met, the station will support the purchase of 300 children's books for the LLL to distribute. At 10:15 am, WHYY staff interviewed the LLL President and co-founder Arlene Rengert about why she values public radio. Arlene is also a member of our

AAUW affiliate. This article was written and submitted before the event, so we do not know if the goal was met, but we trust that it will succeed. The LLL is very grateful to WHYY for its support.

We also would like to thank our AAUW members who continue to donate books to the LLL. As of Oct. 8th, we have 297 laundromat sites in 35 states plus Guam, 960 supporters, and 202,406 donated books! Thank you for your support!

- Sponsor at least one local scholarship per year for a nontraditional student
- Support programs for training and self-development of branch members to promote Association goals.
- Raise funds through community projects and member gifts to support Association goals.

Since its first meeting in 1881, AAUW has been a catalyst for change.
